COVID-19:

Braving the Unknown

We acknowledge the added emotional, social, and financial stresses that many children and their families faced due to COVID-19. We adapted as an organization to support the changing needs and increased urgency felt by children, youth, and their families in York Region.

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In response to COVID-19, we implemented our *Essential Services Response Plan* to protect the safety and well-being of children and families, our staff, and the broader community.

This included providing services through virtual means, except for situations where in-person contact was necessary to mitigate harm to a child. Our response plan aligned with the Provincial Child Welfare Contingency Plan, intended to be a flexible approach to adjust to evolving developments and responses by the Ontario government and Public Health.

As an essential service provider, we continue to provide support to children and their families. We remain committed to working with parents, caregivers, and community organizations to ensure children feel safe, loved, and resilient in their communities through COVID-19 and beyond.

EQUITY AND

Inclusion Charter for York Region

As part of our commitment to equity and inclusion, YRCAS signed the Inclusion Charter for York Region, a regional commitment to create an inclusive environment with equality for all who work, live, and play in York Region. Together with other organizations, we share the vision of a welcoming and inclusive community where everyone can participate freely in society and live with respect, dignity, and freedom from discrimination. The Inclusion Charter for York Region reflects an evolving approach in support of federal and provincial legislation that promotes human rights and accessibility.

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We are proud to affirm our commitment to inclusion, whereby all people feel they belong and have access to the same opportunities.

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EQUITY AND INCLUSION

Our Commitment to Truth and Reconciliation

We acknowledge the sacred land on which we operate, which has been the site of human activity for over 15,000 years. York Region is in the territory of Chippewas of Georgina Island, Huron-Wendat, and the Mississaugas of the New Credit. This territory is the subject of the Dish with One Spoon Wampum Belt covenant, an agreement to peaceably share and care for the resources around the great lakes. This land is still the home of many Indigenous people from across Turtle Island, and we are grateful to have the opportunity to live and work here. We acknowledge and honour our ongoing relationships with the Chippewas of Georgina Island First Nation and Dnaagdawenmag Binnoojiiyag Child and Family Services.



Responding to Anti-Black Racism

2020 brought about broader societal acknowledgment of systemic racism, specifically anti-Black racism. At YRCAS, we know it is critical that we fully recognize the deep-rooted trauma and pain being felt within the Black communities we support, including the Black families, caregivers, and children we work with, and by Black staff. We acknowledge and recognize that systemic anti-Black racism exists in many institutions and systems here in our community, province, and country. This includes Child Welfare.

YRCAS acknowledges the over-representation of Black children and youth in care of Children's Aid Societies. We are committed to working with the sector and our community partners to eliminate disproportionality and disparity for Black families, children, and youth. We know this change requires engaging in difficult conversations, learning, and work. As we step forward in action, we vow to remain committed to listening to the voices of Black children, youth, and families about their frustrations, fears, and the impact racism has in their lives.

In support of a better future for all, we will ensure our work continues to align with the OACAS One Vision, One Voice: Changing the Ontario Child Welfare System to Better Serve African Canadians, which we will do with steadfast dedication and determination. This priority and commitment is rooted in collaboration, action, and impact — for our organization, staff, and community.



YRCAS + 360° KIDS

York Region Youth Homelessness Stabilization Project

Like YRCAS, 360°kids believes every child deserves a safe home.

Our agencies both work from a preventative approach, focused on family integration and life-long support to ensure children and youth are supported through childhood and into adulthood.

Together, YRCAS and 360°kids are working with other agencies with a focus on youth well-being to address local youth homelessness. Through a collective impact approach, we are developing a youth homelessness prevention and stabilization strategy that is inclusive and driven by the voices and experiences of those it intends to serve.

YRCAS + CEDAR CENTRE

Project Hope: York Region's first Child and Youth Advocacy Centre

Imagine a place where all children and youth who have experienced trauma feel welcome and safe. A place where protection, justice, and mental health services are available under one roof, with multi-disciplined teams ensuring processes do not cause further harm. A place where everyone is dedicated to ensuring the right resources are in place to help children, youth, and families begin to heal.

This is the vision of Cedar Centre, York Region Children's Aid Society, York Regional Police, Dnaagdawenmag Binnoojiiyag Child and Family Services, and Jewish Family and Child Service.

We heard from community stakeholders who work with children and youth who have experienced abuse. We agree we can do better. We can improve how we work together so every child, youth, and their family receives the best child-focused investigation, treatment, support services, and advocacy under one roof.

Over the next few years, we will work in partnership towards the development of York Region's first Child and Youth Advocacy Centre (CYAC), collaborating with other organizations in York Region to create a place that minimizes further trauma to a child, feels safe, and respects the diversity that makes our region unique.

YRCAS + SMILEZONE

Neighbours Adam Graves and Scott Bachley wanted to help kids smile by investing in places where kids received help during challenging times. In learning that hospitals, treatment centers, and child welfare organizations dedicate their funding to programming and equipment, Adam and Scott decided to focus on bright, creative, child-friendly design to create spaces that were calm and nurturing for kids.

Together, they founded Smilezone in 2013, which has supported over 220,000 children with hope-filled construction and artistry.

Through the Smilezone application process, YRCAS applied and was accepted for a major makeover! The Smilezone team fully transformed five YRCAS family gathering rooms and a main waiting area in just one weekend!

The goal was to make each space more comfortable for families, with sofas, love seats, change tables, warm lighting, and a dining area. Each room gives the essence of a home-like apartment, designed to provide a welcoming space for families to spend time together and grow their relationships.

Smilezone created custom designs for the rooms that included I-spy murals, sensory items, tactile tables, childfriendly furniture, interactive technology, and much more.





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
